## **Health Research Institute Mentorship Program**

The HRI Mentorship program is a one-year program intended to develop relationships between early-career faculty and senior faculty. Within this program, the mentor and mentee will identify a funding opportunity to work on together, with the mentor providing guidance and insights to the mentee through the entire process. While the mentor may become a co-PI on the grant, this is not a requirement. The goal is to write a funded proposal.

## **Requirements and Instructions**

- Identify your partnership. The mentor must be senior faculty with a record of successful proposals and publications. The mentor/mentee do not need to be in the same department or college. It is preferred that the mentor and mentee are not in the same department.
- 2. Identify your funding opportunity. The purpose of this program is for the mentor to guide the mentee through the proposal process. The proposal must be NIH R15, R21, R01, K awards, OR equivalent mechanisms at other agencies.
- 3. Apply for the program. Each application packet must include the following:
  - a. Current CV for both mentor and mentee.
  - b. Included in one document:
    - i. Statement of purpose describing the rationale and goals for your partnership. (1-page max)
    - ii. Description of the proposed funding mechanism. (1/2-page max)
    - iii. A mentoring plan/timeline that details how the partnership will proceed within the program. (2-page max)

## **Expectations and requirements during the program**

- 1. The mentor will fill out a google form at least quarterly documenting their interactions with the mentee.
- 2. The mentee will fill out a google form at least quarterly documenting their progress on their proposal.
- 3. Upon submission of the grant, the mentor will receive \$750 in their IRAD account. If the proposal is funded, the mentor will receive an additional \$750.
